



Shrivenham C of E Primary School PUPIL PREMIUM STRATEGY 2022-23

The Pupil Premium is an element of school funding aimed at closing the gap in attainment between certain disadvantaged groups of pupils and those who are more well off. There is also a related Service premium of £310 for children of families in the armed services.

The funding is provided to schools, who decide how best to spend this according to local needs.

Provide the necessary academic support for those service PP pupils falling behind or also on the school's SEN register.
